STIGMAON ADOLESCENT SEXUALITY: CHANGING PERSPECTIVES



Adolescent sexuality in a negative context

- Ignorance (e.g. youth health centre Kinshasa)
- Dangerous (e.g. peer education Rwanda)
- Shame and guilt





Consequences:

- Intervention/programmes on: abstinence and risk reduction
- Research on: determinants of risky sexual behaviour, condom use, STI risk, pregnancy, violence etc.
- Stigmatization of sexually active adolescents







Abstinance is the best way to prevent HIV/AIDS, STIs and Unwanted Pregnancy



Since 2000 adolescent sexuality in more positive context

- Mainly visible in western settings
- Sexuality as integral to adolescent identity formation "[s]igns of a shift toward a more normative perspective have begun to appear" (Welsh, 2000)
- Shift to comprehensive/holistic sexuality education
 - instead of risk reduction





At least 100 schools tricked into teaching homosexuality

About 100 schools have been duped into training disguised homosexuality to their teachers and students, according to Saturday Monitor investigations

This shift is prudent...

- Comprehensive' remains problematic
- Opposition against (Standards for) sexuality education
- Literature: only 5 articles worldwide on sexual pleasure among adolescents (Katherine Brown, Coventry)



... but significant and visible in research

- New perspectives on sexual behaviour Eg. Sexual repertoires
- New perspectives on sexual selfhood Eg. Sexual motivations and desire young women, sexual pleasure, diverse sexual orientation and behaviour
- Sexual socialization in the 21st century Eg. Sexual development as a social process - risk versus facilitating factors

Developing countries: body-image, self-esteem, respect, setting boundaries, gender equality

Adolescent boys who have condoms in their pockets are...? sluts, responsible, easy, ...



Inequitable gender norms are linked to poor ASRH outcomes and wellbeing

Research 1:

Qualitative research conducted in: Belgium (Ghent), China (Shanghai), India (New Delhi), US (Baltimore)

A cross-cultural comparison of young adolescents who challenge traditional gender norms



- Traditional gender norms regulate (perceptions of) expressions/behaviour of boys and girls

- Growing acceptability for girls to challenge the norms,

less for boys

-- masculinity dominance







- Challenging traditional gender expressions/behaviour:
 - can vary between cultures
 - acceptance related to specific behaviour
- Challenging gender norms could lead to
 - verbal and
 - physical negative consequences
 - not always





Research 2:

Quantitative research conducted in: Bolivia (Cochabamba) and Ecuador (Cuenca)

A cross - sectional study

Positive attitudes toward gender equality - sexual behavior sexual experiences communication about sex



The research has indicated a correlation between:

Positive attitudes toward gender equality



higher current use contraceptives
 positive (ideas about) sexual
 experiences
 good communication about sex



CONCLUSION

- Stigma is present in (research on) ASRH
 - Adolescent sexuality as negative
 - Gender norms as barriers to develop healthy ASRH
- In Western countries stigma is more and more recognized and trend towards more positive approach is growing





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
